TRANSITIONS AND CHANGES

64% of community members had a change in job in the first year of COVID-19.

Higher Rates of Layoffs and Lower Hiring Rates




Continuing Education with Limited Job **Opportunities**

The following Indigenous groups indicated they had access to income supports;






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Access to Income Supports Continued

People were more likely to be able to access income support if they:


- HAVE CHILDREN

- BETWEEN 34-64 YEARS OLD






Men had more access than women to income supports.


Education



1 in 3 people attended a school or education program.




Eventually Left School
